Overhead low for 'cleaning up'

A former diesel mechanic who

Nelson Cabral is moving into

"I could hit \$100,000 this
year," said Cabral, who started

That will be gross rather than net income, but Cabral has al-most no expenses beyond gaso-line, stationery, and the salaries paid to three part-time staffers who fill in so he never works more than 30 hours a week. The 27-year-old Vancouver

resident estimates his net income this year will hit \$50,000. He credits his success to Brian Winch, a Calgary litter-picker who has taught Cabral and other fledgling entrepreneurs how to earn a living by providing out-door property maintenance. Winch Enterprises services

about 25 commercial buildings around town, mostly small shopping centres and office buildings. He concentrates on garbage

clean-up but also arranges for grass-cutting and snow removal.
"It's a business anyone can start up anywhere," Winch said in an interview. "They can make it part-time — build it as big as they want."

Winch signed up his first client in 1981. He's since become convinced that thousands of people in cities all across North America could be earning a liviage of the country of the country of the country of the country was ing the same way.

To help them do so and to applement his own income, supplement his own income, Winch has put together a business plan and operations manual. It explains eveything from how to get a business licence and insurance to how to set prices in particular parts of the city, and from accounting methods to effective advertising.
